Aims of the Seminar

The aim of the seminar is two-fold:

- (i) To examine the present stage of the theoretical literature dealing with good governance issues and sustainable development; and
- (ii) To specifically focus on the issues of crime, corruption and economic growth, in the context of South and South-east Asian countries and Australia.

Relevance of the Seminar

1. The Seminar will enable the participants to have an initial collective assessment of current research findings of the importance of good governance to sustainable development. The participants of the seminar are all leaders in their own fields in their respective countries and they will be able to directly contribute on the good governance issues and principles from the knowledge they gain by participating in the Seminar.

2. The main focus of the seminar is on Australia and the South and South-east Asian region. What happens to the region in the future has important implications for the long-term geo-political and economic interests of every country in the region.

By providing an opportunity to exchange views and learn from each other's experience, the seminar would improve the chances of success of policy relating to good governance (and elimination of the level of crime and corruption) in the region by collective actions and efforts.

(Note: Papers dealing with theoretical issues as well as with specific issues of individual countries of the region can be presented).

Call for Papers and Seminar Volume (s)

The Organising Committee invites expression of interest from people who wish to present papers on any of the listed topics or on similar topics. Contributions which deal with policy issues, or applications of theory to actual situations are particularly welcome.

A selection of papers presented at the Seminar will be published in a volume (or, volumes) in due course.

Submission of Paper

Papers submitted must NOT have been published or accepted for publication elsewhere. Abstracts of papers (about 200-300 words) should be submitted no later than 8 May, 2009. The Organising Committee reserves the right to request revisions before including papers in the Seminar volume.

Delegates are requested to bring 10 copies of their completed papers for presentation at the seminar.
